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Our Commitment and Support

- To support districts with implementation of Instructional Continuity Plans (ICP) that meet the needs of ALL Florida's students in a safe environment by being responsive to Florida's districts regarding the impact of COVID-19.

Transferability of Title II to Title IV

Question from districts:

What flexibility is available for the purchase of technology to support the district's ICP?





Transferability

- Districts may request to transfer funds from the Title II, Part A program to Title IV, Part A, which may provide greater flexibility to purchase technology for student use.
- An email was sent on March 24 to Title II, Part A and Title IV, Part A directors outlining the process for how to request a funds transfer.



Why Transfer Funds From Title II, Part A?

- Federal regulations dictate that Title II, Part A funds cannot be used to support students or classroom initiatives.
- Title II, Part A funds are reserved for the recruitment, development, and retention of teachers, principals, and other school leaders.



Title IV, Part A Student Support and Academic Enrichment

Question from districts:

How can Title IV, Part A support the purchase of technology to support the district's ICP?



Title IV, Part A

The purpose of Title IV, Part A is to improve student academic achievement by increasing the capacity of state and local educational agencies in the following areas by:

- Providing all students with access to a well-rounded education,
- Improving school conditions for student learning to support safe and healthy students, and
- Improving the use of technology in order to advance digital literacy of all students.



Technology Purchases with Title IV, Part A

- All technology purchases made with Title IV, Part A must directly support students and teachers.
- Districts may purchase electronic devices such as laptops and tablets, access to online academic content, subscriptions to academic content, and internet access in the form of secure hotspots.
- Districts may purchase insurance for devices; however, districts should prioritize obtaining hardware, software, and digital content to support students.
- The current program 15% technology cap on the purchase of hardware, software, and digital content will not apply to funds transferred from Title II, Part A until the end of the current grant cycle because it will improve conditions for safe and healthy students.



Charter Schools

Question from districts:

How does the transfer of Title II, Part A funds to Title IV, Part A impact charter schools?





Impact on Charter Schools

- Districts shall continue to include charter schools in Title II, Part A and Title IV, Part A activities.
- Charter schools are public schools and they shall be supported through either the inclusion of existing district activities or through the set-aside dollar amount option.



Private Schools and Equitable Services

Question from districts:

How does the transfer of Title II, Part A funds to Title IV, Part A impact private schools?



Impact on Private Schools

- Districts shall continue to provide equitable services to private schools.
- Districts shall follow Title IV, Part A equitable service procedures and consult with private schools regarding use of their allocation.
- Transferability is a district decision (after consultation).
 - If the district does not transfer funds then private schools cannot transfer funds.



Amendments for other Federal Programs

Questions from districts:

Is there additional flexibility available for the purchase of technology to support the district's ICP?

How long will amendments take to process?



Review of the Amendment Process

- Amendments will be processed with urgency
- If a planned grant funded activity is unable to occur, the district may request an amendment with the program office.
- If the district has an amendment already under review at FDOE and would like to change the previously requested activities, please contact the program office.

Title I, Part A (TIPA)	July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020
Title I, Part C (Migrant)	July 1, 2019-August 31, 2020
Title I, Part D (N&D)	July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020
Title II, Part A (Supporting Effective Instruction)	July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020
Title III, Part A (ELL)	July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020
Title IV, Part A (SSAE)	August 1, 2019-August 31, 2020
Title V, Part B (RLIS)	July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020
Title IX, Part A (Homeless)	July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020
School Improvement (UniSIG)	September 1, 2019-August 31, 2020



Electronic Submission Process

- The Department is working on an electronic submission process and instructions will be shared with districts as soon as possible.
- Office of Grants Management will provide this guidance.



Question: Can districts temporarily use Title I devices for non-Title I students?

Yes, only if Title I students needs are met first.



Scenario: Services at Title I and Non-Title I schools

Title I Elementary Schools

- 1:1 devices for K-5, funded by Title I
- District ICP
 - K-2 receive instructional packets (no devices needed)
 - 3-5 receive virtual learning (devices needed)

Non- Title I Schools

 Can the devices from the Title I school be used at these schools?

After the needs of Title I students are met, devices may be temporarily used to support non-Title I students.
