Conversation + Active Learning = Vocabulary Will Soar!

- Active Learning-- Kids learn best when they are *actively* experiencing, creating, enjoying, and thinking in a positive learning environment.
- Conversation-- To maximize learning and build vocabulary, it's important to for parents to incorporate a lot of *dialogue* during the experience. Speaking and listening are foundational skills for reading comprehension and writing.

ARPET READY

- Techniques— running-commentary, connecting learning to school and other experiences, asking open-ended questions, etc.
- ELL- Talk with your kids in the language you feel most comfortable with. The learning benefits will transfer to any language used when reading and writing.
