### K<sup>12</sup> FL VIP Students Get Pumped Up for State Testing



Testing season can be a major stress for students, families and their teachers; however, K<sup>12</sup>/Fueleducation teachers have been working diligently to prepare their students throughout the year. The focus is not to teach to the test, but to help students understand and master the Florida Standards. In combination with their K<sup>12/</sup>Fueleducation curriculum, students have been utilizing programs such as Study Island and iReady, as well as attending live sessions with their course teachers. Teachers have also utilized formative and summative assessments to gauge their student's understanding of the standards. The valuable information gained has allowed the teachers, in partnership with their Content Coaches, to determine areas of opportunity and strengths. The data is then used to create small or large group remediation, as well as, to provide insight into what other resources students and families may need. K<sup>12</sup>'s goal is to ensure each student is successful,

not only on their state assessments, but overall academically so they can continue to succeed this year, and in years to follow.
