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Bay Is Still Standing!

October 10th was the day Bay's world was turned upside down by Hurricane Michael. Residents of Bay County are familiar with hurricanes. They live in a coastal area, so they know how to prepare. But, they have learned that you can't prepare for a Category 4 (expected to upgrade to a Category 5 in April) storm with winds of 155 miles per hour. While Bay wasn't prepared to lose the entire electrical, sewer, communications, and internet infrastructure along with the loss of homes, hospitals, schools, businesses, and 99% of Tyndall Air Force Base; they did start the rebuilding process in the



hours following the storm. And they will need to continue rebuilding for many years to come. Most people that live outside of the area ask, "Really, how bad is it in Bay County?" Here are a few school statistics:

Schools were closed for 5 weeks.

Almost 200 employees have left the area.

Over 4,000 students are considered homeless due to the storm. (73% of multi-family apartments were destroyed.)

Enrollment in the district is down by 3,149 students.

Damage to schools was in excess of \$300,000,000.

Operating a virtual school franchise without power and internet was challenging! Bay Virtual appreciated the help and support of virtual program managers as they helped students by resending resources that were lost in the storm, providing hotspots so that students were able to have some limited internet capability, and working to bring the hurricane semester to a conclusion.
