OneBlood Field Trip

This fall, Pinellas Virtual School (PVS) HOPE (Health Opportunities through Physical Education) students took a field trip to OneBlood Laboratories in St. Petersburg, for a behind-the-scenes look at the blood donation process. Thanks to Mr. Daniel Eberts (commonly known as "Dan the Blood Man"), students were able to see donors actively giving blood and then follow that blood into the lab to see how it is processed. Students and parents alike were enthralled and engaged by Mr. Eberts' thorough explanation of how the blood components are used to save patient lives. He also went over the health benefits of donating blood (there are many!). The HOPE course emphasizes advocacy throughout each unit of the course. Blood donation is a way for students to practice advocacy and support their community. High school and college students are the populations most likely to donate, so it is important to educate and encourage them to do so! Pinellas is fortunate to have these young people out in the community armed with the knowledge and desire to save lives.

K¹² Students Love to Read!

Although the ability to read is a vital component to a student's educational success, many students do not have an internal love for reading. Teachers and Learning Coaches sometimes struggle to get their students to engage in the curriculum due to the reading components involved. Many students who dislike reading, also tend to become struggling readers and due to low state test scores, are required to take an Intensive Reading course. For some students, this can add to their discontent; however, the FL Intensive Reading teacher, Ashley Ertle, has worked to provide students with a course that not only helps students to develop necessary reading skills, but encourages the love of reading! Here is some great feedback we have received:



- "He FINISHED his novel!!!!!!!"
- "We are doing the happy dance here! First big novel and he loved it so much he wants to read the others (hobbit). He kept reading today just because he was at the end and wanted to know the outcome."
- "That reading log has been the best thing he's ever done his whole school curriculum. I tagged the advisor, so she can feel the excitement as well. Thanks for all you do, Learning Coach!"
- I got a really nice email today about Intensive Reading (IR). I spoke with this Learning Coach at length at the beginning of the year as she was concerned (and upset) with her student's placement in IR. I actually recommended to the district that he be removed from the course because her concerns were valid and supported by data. This is what she has to say about IR now: "Hi Mrs. Charlton, E. has been in IR for the past month and actually I think he is learning a lot of useful things. So maybe it's best that he stays in IR. Thank you so much for all your help. Learning Coach"

This is a huge testament to Ashley's hard work in making the course relevant and cohesive. Ms. Ertle, in conjunction with the FL Language Arts Content Coach, Jessica Charlton, have worked diligently over the past few years to adapt and create an Intensive Reading course that takes into account the individual needs of the student. Students utilize online and offline materials, including a weekly active reading log that helps guide students through their reading, to ensure that they are not only able to read the words, but also comprehend what they are reading. Students are encouraged to utilize the skills they learn in their Intensive Reading courses throughout their other K¹² courses.

They boarded the ship in their prospective classes and

Virtual Expansion Under Way in Duval

Exploring new frontiers is a way of life for those of us engaged in virtual education. In Duval County, this semester has brought forth exciting additions in working with students with unique challenges. Duval's Hospital/Homebound program is now serving students with the option of a full-time virtual curriculum, allowing more flexible scheduling for students with doctors' appointments and illnesses that don't fit a traditional school calendar. At the River Oak Center, students are using Duval Virtual Instruction Academy (DVIA) to complete their coursework leaving vital



time in the day for further drug and alcohol treatment after residential release. DVIA also works with the Department of Juvenile Justice to accommodate students unable to return to school after program release. Duval County is continuing to try to break the restrictions of the traditional classroom of six periods and four walls.

DVIA is truly excited about the additional supports that are being built at all academic tier levels for full-time students. From elementary through high school, increased performance expectations for parents, students, and teachers are bringing greater student engagement throughout the learning cycle. Incorporating systemic parent/student/teacher conferencing opportunities and triggered academic and attendance intervention is driving more students to regular collaboration with their teachers. Most importantly the school community is working as a team to make sure that no student falls through an online crack.

The part-time program continues to expand with new learning labs being added to Duval County's high schools and middle schools. Most high school students have the option to participate with DVIA as a second school within the regular school day, at their traditional school, increasing the amount of credits available to them in the year. Increasing the county's graduation rate is a top priority.

Of course there is always time for fun and an opportunity to spread the good works that DVIA is doing. Creative recruitment with current and prospective students, is always a good thing!!!







Blended Learning Courses Growing in Palm Beach

What an exciting time to be in virtual education in Palm Beach County! The Edgenuity Blended Learning program has grown to over 3,000 students at the high school level and close to 1,000 students at the middle school level. Students are enrolled in courses such as US Government, Economics with Financial Literacy, Critical Thinking and Study Skills, Career Research and Decision Making, and M/J US History.



Content certified school-based personnel embed full class face-to-face lessons and small group/individualized remediation throughout the course along with the curriculum that is delivered via Edgenuity courseware. The blended learning model is a successful instructional method which combines a variety of approaches thereby freeing up the teacher to circulate and provide individual attention. Blended Learning students appreciate the ability to work at their own pace and have the teacher available in order to make sure that they fully understand concepts. Palm Beach Virtual School Profession Development Session

Statistics indicate that approximately 5% of teenagers are affected by depression, and only 1/3 receive treatment of some kind.

The staff fields many calls from parents of anxious or depressed children seeking an "alternative" to a large traditional school. Due to the increased number of students they serve and for additional training for

mandatory reporters, the Professional Development team chose to bring this training to the staff. The Adolescent Depression Awareness Program (ADAP) through Johns Hopkins Hospital wants to reach as many teachers, students and parents with the "message that depression is a treatable medical illness."

The staff will complete an in-depth survey on their perceptions individually, then they will meet as a group to complete the four (4) hour training.
