# **Course Code Directory**

When one chapter ends, another begins! While we may soon be nearing the end of the school year, plans are already underway for another exciting school year to come! The DOE's Office of Articulation has been working with the Division of K-12 Public Schools and the Division of Career and Adult Education to produce the 2015-2016 Course Code Directory (CCD).

The CCD is a comprehensive information resource that provides general information about the PreK-12 course numbering system; assists counselors, students and parents in schedule planning; provides specific course information; and lists educator certifications for teaching courses.

# **Orange County Virtual School Pilots Online Testing**

This year Orange County Virtual School (OCVS) piloted an innovative new way of offering required

secure testing: via webcam proctor! OCVS is aware that many students choose the virtual schooling environment for the flexibility of scheduling, as well as the ability to be able to work from any remote location. Based on student feedback from last year's numerous state and district required testing sessions, OCVS listened to student feedback, made great strides, and gained district approval to be the first school in Orange County to offer benchmark testing to students outside of a school building. With this new option for 6-11 grade students taking their OCPS benchmark assessments in both October and January, OCVS was able to better accommodate many of their student's hectic schedules.



The on demand test proctoring software allowed for OCVS students to not only to test from home, but also to test anytime within a one-week testing

window. Testing Coordinator, Elena Geiser Hogan, is working on gathering qualitative feedback from student and parent participants and will send out a survey and request for volunteers for one-on-one phone interviews in the coming weeks. OCVS strongly encourages survey participation and honest feedback so they can continue to improve in their endeavor to be the top producer of successful virtual students in the nation.

New for the 2014-2015 school year, students at Orange County Virtual School participate in monthly Book



Club meetings, under the guidance of their sponsor, Ms. Krista Harry. These students love reading and love to share their love of reading with others. # **FLVS Teaches Tomorrow's Writers**



Teachers at Florida Virtual School Full Time K-8 work to strengthen and develop their students' writing in a variety of ways throughout the school year. Last year, our teachers began a conversation about how to support and empower our amazing students as they prepared for the new state writing test. Those conversations developed into planning meetings that focused on topics for student breakout sessions, as well as a session for learning coaches who work alongside their students each day.

In January, our school hosted face-to-face events throughout the state. During these interactive sessions, students and their learning coaches were given the opportunity to dig deeper into their understanding of the new writing Florida Standards Assessments, and last minute ways to help prepare for the March assessment. Sessions were conducted at local libraries

and students participated in specific writing stations to practice their skills and get immediate feedback. Topics covered included crafting writing using text-based evidence; developing a thesis sentence and supporting it with rich details; and addressing a prompt to ensure writing is focused and on topic. Learning coaches reviewed specific information from the Florida Department of Education, including a test-taking paper, scoring rubrics, and excerpts from the FSA Writing Test Administration Manual. Teachers shared grade-level reading passages with prompts and online resources for the parents to use to help students practice in the last few weeks leading up to the test.

### Congratulations to Somerset Virtual Academy and to Florida Connections

**Academy!** They recently completed the DOE's rigorous and comprehensive **Virtual Program Provider approval** process. Somerset Virtual Academy was approved for an additional three years and Florida Connections Academy was approved as a part-time provider for grades 9-12—this in addition to already being approved as a full-time and part-time provider for grades K-8.

The DOE is in the midst of its **first-ever course provider approval** process. Stay tuned as results will be announced in May.

**Legislative session** is in full swing. Two bills, House Bill (HB) 7037 and Senate Bill (SB) 1448 include language to repeal student eligibility criteria to participate in virtual education. In addition, two bills, HB 477 and SB 970 address background screening and notification, to include instructional and other personnel of virtual instruction program providers. We need and value your input as we revise the applications and rules related to program and course provider approvals. We are planning to implement a meaningful renewal process for providers that have done well in their initial approval period.
