# **Bridging the Gap**

I am happy to share Jennifer Handley's story. Jenny is an 8<sup>th</sup> grade science teacher at Williston Middle High School and Levy County's 2016 District Teacher of the Year.

Williston, Florida is home to a large migrant community and many native Spanish speakers. Teaching at Williston Middle High School has allowed me to become familiar with the ESOL population. When I received

an email about the chance to visit Guatemala for three weeks this previous summer to learn Spanish and work in local schools, I immediately pounced on the opportunity. Not only have I always been mesmerized by individuals who are bilingual, I also knew improving my extremely limited Spanish skills would help "bridge the gap" with the students in my own 8<sup>th</sup> grade classroom. I felt that by breaking out of my comfort zone and trying to learn to speak a new language, I would show my non-English speaking students it was possible for them to do the same. I observed a lack of connection between my students, the curriculum and their peers which I believe stemmed from a lack of communication.



Upon my return from Guatemala, I have incorporated my limited use of the Spanish language into my classroom daily. Although my words are often received with an abundance of laughter, I have noticed a drastic change in the willingness of my students who are learning English to actively participate in class and engage with their peers. When they observe my effort and willingness to put myself out there and take the risk of making a mistake, they are much more likely to do the same. I have also found my students developing a passion for lifelong learning as they see me modeling this behavior in the classroom.
