



## Feedback & Lifelong Learning

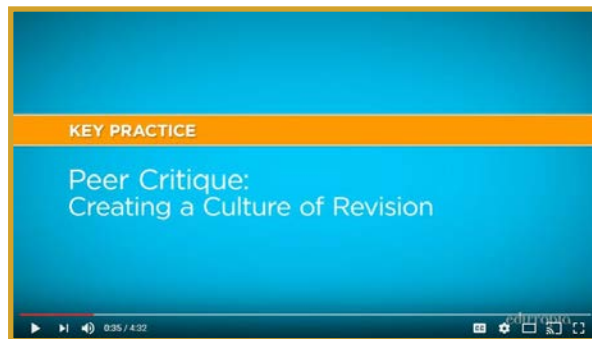

This summer, at the Florida Teacher of the Year Roundtable, Eduardo Briceño, the Co-Founder and CEO at Mindset Works spoke about growth mindset and the powerful effect it can have in our schools. I recently watched this video, [Peer Critique: Creating a Culture of Revision](#) and thought that it was an effective representation of what feedback can look like in our classrooms and how this process supports the development of growth mindset behaviors. “Because our students participate in the critique protocol, they have the opportunity to really understand what quality looks like and to define for themselves their expectation for achieving it.”



When you provide your students the opportunity to practice giving and receiving feedback, you are emphasizing the idea that all students can improve, that we make progress through effective learning strategies and that as a classroom community we are committed to continual learning. 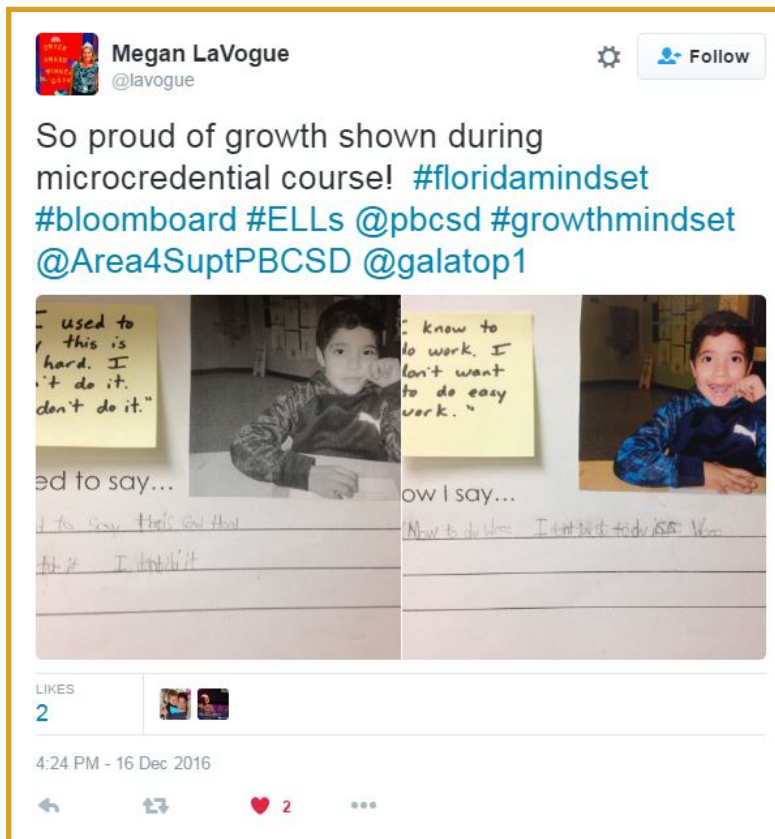
