One of Dr. Dweck's findings that challenges me to grow as a teacher is the power of "yet".

After learning of the power of "yet" I wish that I took a bit more time before grading my papers. I wish that instead of a grade that has such finality, I gave only feedback and the opportunity for students to correct their papers. In the subject of writing this is common practice, but I wish I had done it in math and science as well.

Our students should know that just because they don't understand a specific concept now, does not mean they never will. Dr. Dweck does a remarkable job of explaining how powerful one simple change in our classroom practice can be. "The Power of Yet" gives our students the motivation to keep learning and not give up.
