SEAL OF BILITERACY

Recognition of a high level of competence in speaking, reading, and writing in one or more languages in addition to English

SEAL OF BILITERACY RATIONALE

- Publicly recognize students for exemplary achievements
- Encourage the study of World Languages (K-12) for enhanced cognitive development and for national economy and security
- Proficiency in multiple languages enables Florida to participate in the global political, social and economic context
- Business community benefit because of increased demand for employees to be fluent in more than one language, providing access to an expanded market, and the ability to serve customers better
- Promotion of linguistic proficiency and cultural literacy in one or more languages is designed to keep Florida moving forward toward national and international competitiveness in a global economy by encouraging students to develop bilingual/biliteracy skills for college and career readiness

SEAL OF BILITERACY PURPOSE

- Encourage students to study languages
- Certify attainment of biliteracy
- Provide employers with a method of identifying an individual who has language and biliteracy skills
- Provide a postsecondary institution with a method to recognize and grant postsecondary credit to an applicant who is seeking admission to a postsecondary institution
- Recognize and promote world language instruction in public schools
- Strengthen relationships, affirm the value of diversity, and honor the multiple cultures and languages of a community
- Increase standards to achieve national and international competitiveness

SEAL OF BILITERACY CRITERIA

- English requirements for graduation with a GPA of 2 or above
- Passing score on a statewide, standardized assessment in reading in high school at level 4 or above
- Demonstrating competency on one or more languages
 - Passing a World Language IB exam
 - Passing a World Language AP exam
 - Completing 4 credits of sequential high school world language instruction with a GPA of 3 or above
 - Passing the SAT II World Language exam
