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State School Improvement

State School Improvement Trends

- 70% (53 of 76 schools) exited the School Improvement Support list in 2022.
- 100% (10) of schools graded F in 2019 improved their grades in 2022, including one that earned a B and six that earned a C.
- Of the 25 schools implementing a State Board of Education-approved Turnaround Option Plan, 80% (20 schools) exited School Improvement by earning a 2022 grade of C or higher.

Timeline: 2019-2021

- **November 2019-** Submitted a Turnaround Option Plan (TOP) indicating charter for the 2020-2021 school year **and** requesting the extension to enter into year 3 of the current turnaround plan, external operator (EO).
- **February 2020-** SBE approved the extension for an additional year of their current Turnaround plan with the following conditions:
 - Replace the EO, replace the current principal and retain all Highly Effective and Effective teachers for the 2020-21 school year.
- **May 2020-** Suspension of statewide testing. Superintendent notifies the Department that conditions are not necessary, as grades will not be issued. Warrington would retain the principal and EO for the 2020-21 school year.
- **October 2020-** submitted a TOP indicating charter for the 2021-22 school year **and** requesting the extension to enter into year 3* of the current turnaround plan, external operator (EO).
- **March 2021-** SBE issues Escambia/ Warrington Middle conditions for the 2021-22 school year (see above).

Timeline: 2022

- **January 2022-** submitted TOP indicating charter would begin in 2023-24 school year and the 2022-23 school year would serve as a “transition” year through the implementation of the District Managed Turnaround (DMT) option.
- **May 11, 2022-** SBE approved a TOP that specifies a charter agreement must be in place sixty (60) days from school grade release.
- **October 20, 2022-** Dr. Tim Smith, Superintendent, addressed the SBE regarding O.J. Semmes Elementary School and Turnaround status. The SBE did approve the O.J. Semmes Turnaround Plan.
 - Dr. Smith then addressed the current status of Warrington Middle School. The Escambia School Board met on October 18, 2022, and a proposed charter consultancy contract was on the agenda for consideration. The Escambia School Board did not vote on the proposed charter consultancy contract with Charter Schools USA.
 - The Escambia School Board opted not to consider the agreement. In response to a public comment voicing expertise in charter management, the School Board indicated a preference to consider other options.
 - A charter consultancy contract has been drafted but not yet approved. Charter Schools USA is the designated charter provider. Charter Schools USA will consult in 2022-23 and assume control of school in 2023-24.
- **December 8, 2022-** Charter consultancy agreement executed.
